The Etymology

The Great Commission

Matthew 28:19-20 (KJV):

Jesus' final command to His disciples: **Go and make disciples.**

This wasn't just for the apostles. This was a transfer of authority and mission. **This includes you.**

Evangelism vs. Discipleship

Important distinction:

- **Evangelism** = Introducing people to Jesus
- **Discipleship** = Growing people in Jesus after they believe

Both matter. Both are your responsibility. They're connected but distinct.

Chapter 2 — The Role of the Holy Spirit

The Spirit Does the Work

Chapter 3 — Overcoming Fear Through Love

Where Fear Comes From

Common fears in evangelism:

- **Fear of rejection** — “They’ll think I’m weird”
- **Fear of inadequacy** — “I don’t have all the answers”
- **Fear of judgment** — “I’ll be judged for being ‘Christian’”
- **Fear of confrontation** — “They’ll argue with me”

Shifting From Fear to Love**Fear-based questions:**

- “What if they judge me?”
- “What if I mess this up?”
- “What if they think I’m weird?”

Love-based questions:

- “How can I help them know Jesus?”
- “What would it look like for them to encounter God?”
- “How can I express genuine care?”
- “What do they really need to hear?”

The shift from self-focused fear to other-focused love changes everything.

Practical Steps to Overcome Fear**Step 1: Pray first**

Ask God to replace fear with love and boldness. Make this your foundation.

Step 2: Remember your testimony

What Jesus has done for you is powerful. Remember that power.

Step 3: Start small

Don’t jump into deep conversation with your hardest case. Start with someone more receptive.

Step 4: Do it imperfectly

First conversations are awkward. That’s normal. Awkwardness doesn’t negate faithfulness.

Step 5: Find community

Share your evangelistic journey with others. Don’t do this alone.

Step 6: Give yourself grace

You will mess up. You will say wrong things. You will feel awkward. That’s okay. God works through imperfect vessels.

Chapter 36 — Coffee Shop Conversation

The Setup

The Approach

Respectful, natural, genuine:

The Conversation Flow

"That's tough. I've been through similar. Can I tell you what helped me?"

You've shared faith without being pushy. You've related to them. You've offered something real.

What Happens Next

They might:

- Ask more questions (great — keep listening and sharing)
- Thank you and move on (you've planted a seed)
- Want to know more (invite them to church or to another conversation)
- Get defensive (respect their boundary, remain kind)

Your job was to care, listen, and share. You did that. The outcome is the Holy Spirit's.

Chapter 37 — Gym/Fitness Context

The Unique Challenge

Fitness environment has built-in awkwardness for spiritual conversation. People are sweaty, tired, focused on workout, not particularly open spiritually.

But it's also opportunity.

Natural Entry Points

Over weeks/months of seeing someone regularly:

- Notice details about their life (wedding ring, kids photos on phone, what they're reading)
- Make human connection (not just "nice workout")
- Find common ground (fitness goals, life goals, struggles)
- Eventually: casual spiritual conversation

A Real Scenario

You're on the treadmill next to regular workout buddy. You notice they're particularly hard on themselves after a workout. Always frustrated with "not being good enough."

Chapter 38 — Workplace Breakthrough

The Professional Challenge

Workplace evangelism is tricky. Professional boundaries exist. Not everyone wants faith talk at work.

But workplace is where you spend 40+ hours weekly with people.

Keys to Workplace Witness

1. Be excellent at your job

Don't evangelize by doing bad work and hoping Jesus will fix it.

2. Be genuinely kind

Not performative kindness. Real care for colleagues.

3. Live your faith visibly

Not aggressively. Just authentically. People notice.

4. Don't force conversations

Wait for natural openings — struggles, questions, moments of vulnerability.

Not every workplace conversation is opportunity for evangelism.

Real Story

Coworker mentions they're struggling with anxiety, can't sleep, stressed about future.

You share: "I was the same way until I learned to pray about anxiety instead of just worrying. Sounds simple, but it changed everything. Happy to talk about it more if interested."

Simple offer. No pressure. Door left open.

They might:

- Say no thanks (respect that)
- Ask more questions (great)
- Eventually want to visit your church (excellent)

You've planted seed. That's success.

Chapter 39 — Family Member Comes to Faith

The Most Important and Hardest Context

Family evangelism is unique because:

- They know you deeply (can see if faith is real)
- You have history and baggage
- Rejection feels personal
- But salvation has ultimate weight

Why Family Is Hardest

Mark 6:4 (KJV):

"But Jesus said unto them, A prophet is not without honour, but in his own country, and among his own kin."

Jesus acknowledged that family witnesses you in your worst moments. They know where you've failed. They've heard you lose your temper, act hypocritically, struggle.

This makes your witness harder.

What Actually Works

1. Live your faith consistently

Chapter 41 — Online Conversation Bears Fruit

Digital Age Evangelism

Online evangelism is different:

- Conversation happens over time
- Written words only (no body language)
- Easier to disconnect
- But also easier to be vulnerable

Principles for Digital Evangelism

1. Be authentic

Don't present fake online persona different from real self.

2. Don't be preachy

Online preaching is even more off-putting than in-person.

Not Every Conversation Works

This is crucial to understand.

Some people:

- Reject Jesus outright
- Say they'll believe then don't
- Make fun of your faith
- Become hostile

This doesn't mean you failed.

Real Failure Story #1

I shared my faith with a coworker. He seemed open. Asked questions. I thought conversion was imminent.

Then he ghosted. Stopped talking to me. Avoided me at work.

What I learned: Not every apparent openness leads to faith. The Holy Spirit's timing isn't my timeline.

Real Failure Story #2

I invited a friend to church multiple times. He kept saying yes, then canceling.

Eventually he told me he wasn't interested. Didn't want to discuss it further.

Real Failure Story #3

I launched into Gospel presentation too quickly with someone. Didn't build relationship first. They felt preached at.

Result: Damaged relationship, missed opportunity.

What I learned: Relationship often has to come before proclamation. Evangelism is a marathon, not sprint.

What Failure Teaches

Failure in evangelism teaches:

- You're not responsible for conversions (Holy Spirit is)
- Faithfulness matters more than results
- Relationship is foundation for Gospel
- Patience is essential
- Grace for yourself when you mess up

Prayer Changes Everything

Evangelism divorced from prayer is just talking.

Evangelism rooted in prayer is partnership with God.

Prayers for Evangelism

Prayer of Boldness:

“Holy Spirit, give me courage to speak about Jesus, despite fear. Help my words be filled with Your power, not my eloquence.”

Prayer of Openness:

“God, open hearts around me to receive Gospel. Soften hardened hearts. Create spiritual hunger. Guide me to right people at right times.”

“Lord, use my witness. Plant seeds. Convict hearts. Draw people to Yourself. Do what only You can do.”

Prayer of Humility:

Join with others. Share your journey.

Benefits:

- Encouragement when discouraged
