Each calling built on previous one. Each one started with signs I'll describe in this resource.

Your calling journey will be different. But the process of recognizing, testing, and responding is similar.

**Let's discover how God calls people and how to recognize when He's calling you.**

## PART 1 — UNDERSTANDING GOD'S CALL

### Chapter 1: What Is a Calling?

#### Defining Calling

**Calling is God's invitation to participate in His purposes.**

It's NOT:

- Your job title (though calling may inform career)
- Your religious duty (calling is invitation, not obligation)
- One-time event (calling unfolds progressively)
- Same for everyone (calling is personal and unique)
- Always clear immediately (often discovered over time)

It IS:

- Personal invitation from God to you
- Specific purpose God has for your life
- Divine direction toward fulfilling destiny
- Ongoing relationship where God reveals and you respond
- Partnership between your will and God's purpose

#### Biblical Word for Calling

**Greek word:** "klesis" (κλήσις)

**Means:** "calling, invitation, summons"

Used in Scripture to describe:

- **Salvation calling** — Called to be saved (Romans 8:30)
- **Holy living calling** — Called to holiness (1 Thessalonians 4:7)
- **Ministry calling** — Called to specific work (Acts 13:2)
- **Vocational calling** — Called to specific role (Ephesians 4:1)

#### Two Primary Types of Calling

**1. General Calling (Universal)** Every Christian receives this:

- Called to salvation (believe in Jesus)
- Called to holiness (live righteously)
- Called to love (love God and others)
- Called to witness (share Gospel)
- Called to discipleship (follow Jesus)

This applies to ALL believers.

**2. Specific Calling (Individual)** Each Christian receives unique calling:

- Called to specific ministry
- Called to specific vocation
- Called to specific people group
- Called to specific geographical location
- Called to specific role in body of Christ

This is UNIQUE to you.

### How Calling Works

Calling unfolds progressively:

**Stage 1: Initial Stirring** God places desire, burden, or interest on your heart. Something shifts internally. You notice something you didn't before. A topic captivates you. A need moves your heart.

**Stage 2: Growing Conviction** The stirring becomes persistent, refuses to go away. You can't shake it. Others mention it. Scripture addresses it. You keep thinking about it.

**Stage 3: Confirmation** God confirms through Scripture, people, circumstances. Multiple sources align. Community validates what you're sensing. Evidence accumulates.

**Stage 4: Preparation** God develops gifting, character, and skills needed. Training appears. Experiences prepare you. Weaknesses are addressed. You become equipped.

**Stage 5: Opportunity** Doors open for you to step into calling. Resources appear. Invitation comes. Timing aligns. Circumstances facilitate.

**Stage 6: Obedience** You respond by taking action. Initial step forward. Faith-filled commitment. Public declaration. Personal decision.

**Stage 7: Fulfillment** You walk out calling daily. Daily practices sustain. Ministry multiplies. Impact grows. Purpose deepens.

### Why Calling Matters

Living in your calling provides:

**Purpose** — You know why you exist. Life has clear direction. Decisions become clearer. Motivation increases. Rest increases (no wandering).

**Fulfillment** — You're doing what you're created for. Work feels meaningful. Joy in service. Satisfaction in impact. Deep contentment.

**Effectiveness** — You're operating in your gifting. Results multiply. Impact increases. Kingdom advances. Fruitfulness evident.

**Peace** — You're aligned with God's will. Less anxiety about future. Confidence in purpose. Security in God's plan. Supernatural calm.

## Chapter 2: Biblical Examples of Calling

### Moses: Called from Burning Bush

#### Exodus 3:1-10 (KJV)

**The Story:** Moses, fugitive in desert after forty years of exile, encounters burning bush. God calls him to deliver Israel from Egypt.

#### Exodus 3:4-5 (KJV)

*“And when the LORD saw that he turned aside to see, God called unto him out of the midst of the bush, and said, Moses, Moses. And he said, Here am I. And he said, Draw not nigh hither: put off thy shoes from off thy feet, for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground.”*

#### Signs of Calling:

- **Divine encounter** — Bush that doesn't burn up (supernatural)
- **Personal address** — God calls him by name (intimacy)
- **Clear mission** — “Bring my people out of Egypt” (specific)
- **Promised presence** — “I will be with you” (provision)
- **Confirmation sign** — “You will worship on this mountain” (future certainty)

#### Moses' Response:

- Initial doubt — “Who am I?” (Exodus 3:11)
- Questions — “What if they don't believe?” (Exodus 4:1)
- Excuses — “I'm not eloquent” (Exodus 4:10)
- Fear — “Send someone else” (Exodus 4:13)
- Eventually: Obedience — “Here am I, send me” (Exodus 4:28-31)

#### What We Learn:

- Calling can interrupt normal life dramatically
- God calls the reluctant and inadequate
- Objections are normal and expected
- God provides what's needed for calling
- Obedience often follows hesitation
- Past mistakes don't disqualify us

### David: Called as Shepherd Boy

#### 1 Samuel 16:1-13 (KJV)

**The Story:** Samuel sent by God to Jesse's house to anoint next king. God passes over David's seven older brothers and chooses David (youngest, a shepherd).

#### 1 Samuel 16:12-13 (KJV)

*“And he sent, and brought him in. Now he was ruddy, and withal of a beautiful countenance, and goodly to look to. And the LORD said, Arise, anoint him: for this is he. Then Samuel took the horn of oil, and anointed him in the midst of his brethren: and the Spirit of the LORD came upon David from that day forward.”*

### Signs of Calling:

- **Prophetic confirmation** — Samuel sent by God with specific mission
- **Divine selection** — God chose him specifically over others
- **Anointing** — Spirit came upon David powerfully (tangible)
- **Character preparation** — Shepherding prepared him for kingship
- **Long wait** — Years between anointing and actual throne (testing)

### David's Journey:

- Anointed as youth (1 Samuel 16:13)
- Served Saul faithfully (1 Samuel 16:19-23)
- Waited years for fulfillment (tests and trials)
- Became king at God's timing (2 Samuel 2:4)
- Fulfilled calling despite obstacles

### 1 Samuel 17:34-37 (KJV) — David's faithfulness in small things:

*“And David said unto Saul, Thy servant kept his father's sheep: and there came a lion, and a bear, and took a lamb out of the flock: And I went out after him, and smote him, and delivered it out of his mouth: and when he arose against me, I caught him by his beard, and smote him, and slew him. Thy servant slew both the lion and the bear: and this uncircumcised Philistine shall be as one of them, seeing he hath defied the armies of the living God.”*

### What We Learn:

- God calls unlikely people (youngest, least likely)
- Calling often requires long preparation before fulfillment
- Character matters more than credentials or ability
- Faithfulness in small prepares for large (Luke 16:10)
- Timing is God's, not ours
- Testing is part of preparation

### Esther: Called for Such a Time

#### Esther 4:12-14 (KJV)

**The Story:** Jewish orphan becomes queen of Persia through unexpected circumstances. When Jews threatened with genocide, Mordecai challenges her to act.

#### Esther 4:14 (KJV)

*“For if thou altogether holdest thy peace at this time, then shall there enlargement and deliverance arise to the Jews from another place; but thou and thy father's house shall be destroyed: and who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this?”*

### Signs of Calling:

- **Strategic positioning** — In right place at right time
- **Burden for people** — Cared deeply about Jews' fate
- **Unique access** — Only she could approach king (Esther 4:11)
- **Confirmatory word** — Mordecai's challenge articulated purpose
- **Courage required** — “If I perish, I perish” (Esther 7:3-6)

### Esther's Response:

- Initial fear (Esther 4:11)
- Request for support — Asks for fasting (Esther 4:16)
- Courageous action — Approaches king (Esther 5:1-2)
- Strategic wisdom — Plans carefully (Esther 5:4-8)
- Successful deliverance — Jews saved (Esther 9:1-2)

### Esther 7:3-6 (KJV)

*“Then Esther the queen answered and said, If I have found favour in thy sight, O king, and if it please the king, let my life be given me at my petition, and my people at my request: For we are sold, I and my people, to be destroyed, to be slain, and to perish. But if we had been sold for bondmen and bondwomen, I had held my tongue, although the enemy could not countervail the king's damage.”*

### What We Learn:

- Calling often involves personal risk and sacrifice
- God positions you strategically for specific purposes
- Community support and intercession crucial (fasting)
- Courage is developed through preparation, not innate
- “For such a time as this” — perfect timing in God's plan
- Calling often hidden until moment of crisis

### Paul: Called on Damascus Road

#### Acts 9:1-19 (KJV)

**The Story:** Saul (zealous persecutor of Christians) encounters Jesus on road to Damascus. Dramatically converted and called to preach Gospel to Gentiles.

#### Acts 9:4-6 (KJV)

*“And he fell to the earth, and heard a voice saying unto him, Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou me? And he said, Who art thou, Lord? And the Lord said, I am Jesus whom thou persecutest: it is hard for thee to kick against the pricks. And he trembling and astonished said, Lord, what wilt thou have me to do? And*

*the Lord said unto him, Arise, and go into the city, and it shall be told thee what thou must do."*

### Signs of Calling:

- **Dramatic encounter** — Jesus appeared to him personally (supernatural)
- **Total transformation** — From persecutor to preacher (complete reversal)
- **Specific mission** — "My chosen instrument to carry my name" (Acts 9:15)
- **Prophetic confirmation** — Ananias sent with specific message (Acts 9:10-16)
- **Gifts aligned** — His education useful for ministry (Acts 22:3)

### Paul's Journey:

- Immediate conversion (Acts 9:18)
- Period of preparation in Arabia (Galatians 1:17-18)
- Gradual acceptance by church (Acts 9:26-28)
- Multiple missionary journeys (Acts 13-28)
- Fulfilled calling despite persecution

### Acts 9:15-16 (KJV)

*"But the Lord said unto him, Go thy way: for he is a chosen vessel unto me, to bear my name before the Gentiles, and kings, and the children of Israel: For I will shew him how great things he must suffer for my name's sake."*

### What We Learn:

- God can interrupt any life, no matter how resistant
- Past doesn't disqualify you (persecutor became apostle)
- Calling can be dramatic and unmistakable
- Preparation follows calling (Arabia for 3 years)
- Persecution accompanies authentic calling (2 Corinthians 11:23-28)
- God's grace transforms completely

### Mary: Called to Bear Messiah

#### Luke 1:26-38 (KJV)

**The Story:** Angel Gabriel visits young Mary, announces she'll conceive and bear Son of God. Unprecedented calling for obscure peasant girl.

#### Luke 1:26-28 (KJV)

*"And in the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent from God unto a city of Galilee, named Nazareth, To a virgin espoused to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David; and the virgin's name was Mary. And the angel came in unto her, and said, Hail, thou that art highly favoured, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women."*

### Signs of Calling:

- **Angelic visitation** — Supernatural encounter (tangible)
- **Divine favor** — “Highly favoured” — chosen specifically
- **Impossible task** — Virgin will conceive (requires faith)
- **Confirmatory sign** — Elizabeth pregnant (Zechariah will confirm)
- **Prophetic word** — “He will be great” (Isaiah 7:14 fulfilled)

### Luke 1:30-35 (KJV)

*“And the angel said unto her, Fear not, Mary: for thou hast found favour with God. And, behold, thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a son, and shalt call his name JESUS. He shall be great, and shall be called the Son of the Highest: and the Lord God shall give unto him the throne of his father David: And he shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end. Then said Mary unto the angel, How shall this be, seeing I know not a man? And the angel answered and said unto her, The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee, and the power of the Highest shall overshadow thee: therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God.”*

### Mary's Response:

- Initial fear and questions (Luke 1:29, 34)
- Humble acceptance (Luke 1:38)
- “Let it be to me according to your word”
- Full surrender — Willing despite tremendous cost
- Faithful despite difficulty and misunderstanding

### Luke 1:38 (KJV)

*“And Mary said, Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word.”*

### What We Learn:

- Calling may be costly and carry personal sacrifice
- God's plans may seem impossible or outside normal parameters
- Humility opens door to receiving calling
- Complete trust required when details unclear
- Obedience comes despite uncertainty and fear
- Calling often involves elements beyond our understanding

### Common Patterns in Biblical Callings

All these stories share consistent elements:

1. **Divine Initiative** — God initiates, not humans. Never human self-promotion. Always God's selection.
2. **Personal Address** — God calls specifically, intimately. By name, personally. Not anonymous or generic.
3. **Specific Mission** — Clear (or gradually revealed) purpose. Defined scope. Identifiable goal.

4. **Human Hesitation** — Initial doubt, fear, questions. Objections common. Not instant enthusiasm.
5. **Divine Assurance** — God promises presence and provision. Reassurance given. Confidence provided.
6. **Confirmation Signs** — God confirms through multiple means. Scripture, people, circumstances align. Repeated validation.
7. **Obedient Response** — Eventually, they say yes. Action taken. Commitment made.
8. **Fulfillment** — God's purposes accomplished. Through obedience. With provision.

## Chapter 3: Types of Callings

### Calling #1: Called to Salvation

#### The First and Most Important Calling

##### Romans 8:30 (KJV)

*“Moreover whom he did predestinate, them he also called: and whom he called, them he also justified: and whom he justified, them he also glorified.”*

#### What it means:

- God calls you to believe in Jesus
- God invites you into relationship with Him
- God offers salvation and forgiveness freely
- You respond by faith and acceptance

##### 2 Timothy 1:9 (KJV)

*“Who hath saved us, and called us with an holy calling, not according to our works, but according to his grace which was given us in Christ Jesus before the world began.”*

**Everyone needs this calling first.** Until you respond to God's salvation call, nothing else matters. Accepting Jesus as Savior is your primary calling.

### Calling #2: Called to Holiness

#### The Universal Christian Calling

##### 1 Thessalonians 4:7 (KJV)

*“For God hath not called us unto uncleanness, but unto holiness.”*

#### What it means:

- Live righteously and set apart
- Reflect Christ's character in daily life
- Resist sin and temptation
- Grow in sanctification
- Be set apart for God's purposes

## 1 Peter 1:15-16 (KJV)

*“But as he which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation; Because it is written, Be ye holy; for I am holy.”*

**Every Christian is called to holy living.** This isn't optional. All followers of Jesus are called to pursue holiness, develop character, and reflect God's nature.

### Calling #3: Called to Ministry

#### Specific Calling to Full-Time Ministry

## Acts 13:2 (KJV)

*“As they ministered to the Lord, and fasted, the Holy Ghost said, Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them.”*

#### What it means:

- Full-time vocational ministry
- Pastor, missionary, evangelist roles
- Dedicated to Gospel and church work
- Church leadership and teaching
- Ministry as primary vocation and calling

## Ephesians 4:11-13 (KJV)

*“And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ.”*

**Not everyone called to this, but some are.** God selects some to dedicate themselves fully to ministry. If you sense this calling, pray and test it carefully.

### Calling #4: Called to Marketplace Ministry

#### Using Professional Career for Kingdom Purposes

## Colossians 3:23 (KJV)

*“And whatsoever ye do, do it heartily, as to the Lord, and not unto men; Knowing that ye serve the Lord Christ.”*

#### What it means:

- Your career is your mission field
- Professional work glorifies God through excellence
- Kingdom values transform workplace
- Your witness through integrity and skill
- Ministry IN your job, not separate from it

## 1 Peter 4:10 (KJV)

*"As every man hath received the gift, even so minister the same one to another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God."*

**Most Christians called to this.** Your job isn't just about paychecks. God can use your profession to advance His kingdom and minister to people around you.

### **Calling #5: Called to Teaching**

#### **Gifting to Teach and Explain Truth**

##### **James 3:1 (KJV)**

*"My brethren, be not many masters, knowing that we shall receive the greater condemnation."*

##### **What it means:**

- Explaining Scripture accurately
- Teaching biblical truth clearly
- Discipling others through education
- Formal or informal teaching roles
- Gift for making complex concepts simple

##### **Romans 12:7 (KJV)**

*"Or ministry, let us wait on our ministering: or he that teacheth, on teaching."*

**Some specifically called and gifted.** Teaching is a specific calling requiring both gifting and character. Teachers answer to higher standard (James 3:1).

### **Calling #6: Called to Leadership**

#### **Leading Others Toward God's Purposes**

##### **1 Timothy 3:1 (KJV)**

*"This is a true saying, If a man desire the office of a bishop, he desireth a good work."*

##### **What it means:**

- Leading church, ministry, or organization
- Casting vision and direction
- Developing and empowering others
- Decision-making authority and responsibility
- Spiritual oversight of people

##### **1 Peter 5:1-4 (KJV)**

*"The elders which are among you I exhort, who am also an elder, and a witness of the sufferings of Christ, and also a partaker of the glory that shall be revealed: Feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint, but willingly; not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind; Neither as being lords over God's heritage, but being ensamples to the flock."*

**Leadership calling requires character and gifting.** Not everyone is called to leadership, but those who are must develop both spiritual maturity and practical skills.

## Calling #7: Called to Intercession

### Dedicated Prayer Ministry

#### 1 Timothy 2:1 (KJV)

*"I exhort therefore, that, first of all, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for all men."*

#### What it means:

- Prayer becomes your primary ministry
- Standing in gap for others
- Spiritual warfare through prayer
- Burden for specific people/places/nations
- Prayer warrior calling

#### Ephesians 6:18-19 (KJV)

*"Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints; And for me, that utterance may be given unto me, that I may open my mouth boldly, to make known the mystery of the gospel."*

**Some uniquely called to prayer ministry.** Intercessors are unsung heroes. Their ministry of prayer is just as vital as any visible ministry.

## Calling #8: Called to Prophecy

### Speaking God's Word to Specific Situations

#### 1 Corinthians 14:1 (KJV)

*"Follow after charity, and desire spiritual gifts, but rather that ye may prophesy."*

#### What it means:

- Hearing from God clearly
- Speaking God's word to situations
- Timely prophetic voice
- Building up, encouraging church
- Warning and encouraging others

#### 1 Corinthians 14:3 (KJV)

*"But he that prophesieth speaketh unto men to edification, and exhortation, and comfort."*

**Prophetic calling requires discernment and testing.** Not all who prophesy have the calling. Test all prophetic words against Scripture (1 Thessalonians 5:19-21).

## Calling #9: Called to Missions

### Cross-Cultural Gospel Proclamation

#### Matthew 28:19-20 (KJV)

*“Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen.”*

#### What it means:

- Taking Gospel across cultures
- Long-term or short-term missions
- Leaving comfort for Gospel
- Cross-cultural ministry and adaptation
- Reaching unreached people groups

#### Acts 1:8 (KJV)

*“But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth.”*

**Some specifically called to go.** Missions is the heart of Jesus. Some are called to literally go, most are called to send and support.

## Calling #10: Called to Service & Compassion

### Meeting Physical and Emotional Needs

#### Matthew 25:35-36 (KJV)

*“For I was an hungred, and ye gave me meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink: I was a stranger, and ye took me in: Naked, and ye clothed me: I was sick, and ye visited me: I was in prison, and ye came unto me.”*

#### What it means:

- Serving suffering and marginalized people
- Compassion ministry
- Meeting practical needs
- Homeless, hungry, imprisoned, sick
- Acts of mercy

#### 1 John 3:17-18 (KJV)

*“But whoso hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him? My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue; but in deed and in truth.”*

**Service calling is powerful witness.** Compassion ministry demonstrates Jesus' love more than words ever could. Some are specifically called to serve.

## PART 3 — TYPES OF CALLINGS

### Chapter 11: Called to Ministry

#### What Ministry Calling Means

**Ministry calling is God's invitation to dedicate yourself to His work full-time.**

This might include:

- Pastoral ministry (leading church)
- Missionary work (spreading Gospel)
- Evangelistic ministry (winning lost)
- Youth ministry (discipling young people)
- Prison ministry (serving incarcerated)
- Hospital ministry (spiritual care)
- Campus ministry (university ministry)
- Church planting (establishing new churches)

#### How to Recognize Ministry Calling

Ministry calling typically includes several elements:

- 1. Clear Conviction** — Deep sense that God wants you in ministry. Conviction grows over time. Can't shake feeling. Intensifies rather than diminishes.
- 2. Confirmed Gifting** — Others recognize spiritual gifts. You have natural abilities for ministry. Teaching, leadership, evangelism evident. People respond to your ministry.
- 3. Tested Character** — Spiritual maturity evident. Godly character developed. Love for Jesus evident. Desire to serve others.
- 4. Community Confirmation** — Church leaders affirm calling. Mentors encourage you. Multiple people suggest ministry. Leadership invites you to serve.
- 5. Burden for People** — You care deeply about lost souls. Broken-heartedness for God's people. Desire to see people transformed. Willingness to sacrifice for people.
- 6. Readiness to Sacrifice** — Willing to give up financially. Accept lower salary. Be available at all times. Personal needs secondary.

- Missionary (cross-cultural)
- Evangelist (winning lost)

## Testing Your Ministry Calling

Before entering ministry, test your calling:

**1. Does Scripture Support It?** Is this biblical calling? Do you have biblical qualifications? Does purpose align with Scripture?

**1 Timothy 3:1-13 (KJV)** outlines qualifications for church leaders. Study these carefully.

**2. Do Church Leaders Confirm?** Does your pastor affirm calling? Do elders encourage you? Are leaders willing to send you? Do they see gifting in you?

**3. Have You Been Tested in Ministry?** Served faithfully in church? Been given increasing responsibility? Proven character in small things? Able to handle criticism?

**4. Can You Support Yourself?** Financially ready for less income? Family supportive? Can manage financial stress?

**5. Is There Fruit?** People responding to your ministry? Lives being changed? Spiritual growth evident? Impact multiplying?

## Preparation for Ministry

If called to ministry, preparation is critical:

**Educational Preparation:** Bible college or seminary. Theological training. Pastoral training courses. Continuing education.

**Spiritual Preparation:** Deep prayer life. Scripture knowledge. Spiritual disciplines. Character development.

**Practical Preparation:** Volunteer ministry. Mentoring under pastor. Leading small groups. Serving faithfully.

**Personal Preparation:** Family support. Financial planning. Emotional readiness. Willingness to sacrifice.

## Chapter 12: Called to Marketplace Ministry

### Understanding Marketplace Ministry

**Marketplace ministry means God has called you to use your professional career as your primary mission field.**

Your job isn't separate from your faith. Your workplace is where God intends for you to advance His kingdom and minister to people.

### Colossians 3:23-24 (KJV)

*“And whatsoever ye do, do it heartily, as to the Lord, and not unto men; Knowing that ye serve the Lord Christ. But he that doeth wrong shall receive for the wrong which he hath done: and there is no respect of persons.”*

**This means your work has eternal significance when done for God's glory.**

### Types of Marketplace Ministry

**Business Owner:** Building business kingdom-aligned. Providing jobs to believers. Using profit for kingdom. Business as ministry platform.

**Employee/Professional:** Witnessing through your work. Excellence reflecting God's character. Integrity in dealings. Mentoring coworkers.

**Educator:** Teaching in public schools. Influencing next generation. Living out faith daily. Modeling Christ to students.

**Medical Professional:** Healthcare ministry. Serving in hospitals. Holistic care including spiritual. Demonstrating compassion.

**Legal Professional:** Justice and righteousness. Defending the vulnerable. Ethical legal practice. Serving poor pro bono.

**Creative Professional:** Arts reflecting God's nature. Music, design, literature. Creating beauty. Cultural impact.

### How Marketplace Ministry Works

**Marketplace ministry is primarily about your presence and influence, not just activities.**

**1. Your Witness** — People observe your faith. Notice your integrity. See your values. Watch how you handle challenges.

### Matthew 5:16 (KJV)

*“Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven.”*

**Time:** Long work hours. Limited time for church. Difficulty in quiet time. Family time affected.

**Spiritual Drought:** Feeling disconnected from God. Worldly environment's influence. Difficulty maintaining faith. Surrounded by unbelievers.

**Respect:** Not taken seriously as believer. Mocked for faith. Passed over for promotions. Discrimination possible.

## Thriving in Marketplace Ministry

To succeed in marketplace ministry:

1. **Build Your Foundation** — Strong prayer life. Regular Bible reading. Accountability relationships. Church community.
2. **Live with Integrity** — Do what you say. Be honest always. Keep promises. Don't take shortcuts.
3. **Show Excellence** — Quality work. On-time delivery. Detail-oriented. Go beyond expectations.
4. **Build Genuine Relationships** — Listen more than talk. Show genuine interest. Help when possible. Don't be pushy.
5. **Be Ready to Share** — Know your testimony. Understand Gospel. Ready to discuss faith. Let conversation happen naturally.
6. **Maintain Balance** — Protect family time. Don't overcommit. Maintain spiritual disciplines. Don't let work become idol.

## The Power of Marketplace Ministry

Marketplace ministry is powerful because:

**Access:** You have access to people that churches don't reach.

**Credibility:** Your life at work demonstrates real faith, not just Sunday faith.

**Influence:** Your workplace respects you; they'll listen to your words.

**Multiplication:** You touch dozens of people daily in normal work.

**Continuity:** You're there long-term, building trust and relationship.

## Chapter 13: Called to Missions

### Understanding Missions Calling

**Missions calling is God's invitation to leave your comfort zone and bring Gospel to unreached people and places.**

This might mean:

- Moving to another country
- Learning a new language
- Adapting to new culture
- Living with limited resources
- Sacrificing personal comfort
- Serving cross-culturally

### Matthew 28:19-20 (KJV)

*“Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen.”*

### Types of Missions Calling

**Long-Term Missionary:** 5-40+ years in one location. Learn language fluently. Establish churches. Disciple leaders. Deep cultural integration.

**Short-Term Missionary:** 6 weeks — 2 years. Specific project focus. Support existing work. Learn missions firsthand. Gateway to long-term.

**Business-as-Mission:** Use business to support ministry. Create jobs for locals. Platform for Gospel. Sustainable income.

**Medical Missions:** Healthcare workers. Serving in clinics/hospitals. Holistic care. Demonstrate compassion.

**Educational Missions:** Teaching in schools. Training local leaders. University ministry. Discipleship through education.

**Evangelistic Missions:** Focus on Gospel proclamation. Short-term crusades. Church planting. Discipleship of converts.

### Recognizing Missions Calling

Missions calling typically includes:

- 1. Burden for Specific Place/People** — Particular country on your heart. Specific people group burdens you. News of that place affects you. Can't stop thinking about them.
- 2. Willingness to Sacrifice** — Ready to leave comfort. Willing to live simply. Accept culture shock. Family willing to go.
- 3. Practical Preparation** — Learning language. Getting training. Making connections. Saving resources.
- 4. Confirmation from Others** — Mentors encourage it. Church affirms it. Mission organizations confirm it. Mature believers validate it.
- 5. Opening Doors** — Opportunities appearing. Connections made. Organizations interested. Circumstances aligning.
- 6. Persistent Conviction** — Doesn't go away. Strengthens with time. Others keep suggesting it. You keep coming back to it.

## Preparation for Missions

**Don't rush into missions. Prepare carefully.**

**Spiritual Preparation:** Deep prayer life. Bible knowledge. Strong faith foundation. Character maturity.

**Practical Preparation:** Secure support team. Raise financial support. Get training/education. Build relationships with mission organization.

**Physical Preparation:** Health check. Physical conditioning. Medical vaccines. Dental care.

**Language Preparation:** Begin studying language. Learn about culture. Understand history. Study politics/religion.

**Family Preparation:** Spouse fully committed. Children prepared. Extended family supporting. Financially ready.

## The Missions Pipeline

Typical journey:

- Burden develops for place/people
- Local ministry strengthened
- Short-term trips taken
- Support team built
- Financial support raised
- Training/education completed
- Sent out by church
- Long-term commitment begins

## Life Cycles in Missions

Typical missionary experiences:

**Honeymoon Phase (0-6 months):** Everything is exciting. Novel and fresh. Energy high. Learning rapid.

**Culture Shock Phase (6-18 months):** Novelty wears off. Difficulties evident. Language frustrating. Homesickness hits. Questions arise.

**Adaptation Phase (18-36 months):** Beginning to understand culture. Relationships deepening. Effectiveness increasing. Greater comfort. Real work begins.

**Establishment Phase (3-5 years):** Fully adapted. Leadership emerging. Ministry multiplying. Kingdom advancing. Real impact visible.

**Satisfaction/Plateau (5+ years):** Deep relationships. Language fluent. Cultural understanding. Work established. Deciding on permanence.

## Challenges in Missions

**Physical Challenges:** Disease/illness. Poor living conditions. Limited healthcare. Climate adaptation. Food differences.

**Emotional Challenges:** Homesickness. Culture shock. Loneliness. Lack of community. Missing family.

- Casting vision
- Making decisions
- Bearing responsibility

#### 1 Peter 5:2-3 (KJV)

*“Feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint, but willingly; not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind; Neither as being lords over God's heritage, but being ensamples to the flock.”*

### Leadership vs. Management

Leadership and management are different:

**Leadership:** Vision and direction. Influence and inspiration. Change and growth. People development. Purpose-driven.

**Management:** Systems and processes. Control and coordination. Efficiency. Task completion. Maintenance.

You can be a manager without being a leader. True spiritual leadership combines both but prioritizes people.

### Types of Leadership Callings

**Church Leadership:** Senior pastor. Associate/assistant pastor. Worship leader. Children's ministry director. Youth leader.

**Ministry Leadership:** Mission director. Parachurch leader. Non-profit director. Ministry team leader. Small group leader.

**Business Leadership:** CEO/President. Business owner. Department manager. Team leader. Supervisor.

**Community Leadership:** Civic leader. Community activist. School board member. Nonprofit board member. Community organizer.

### Recognizing Leadership Calling

Leadership calling typically shows:

1. **People Naturally Follow You** — Others respect your opinion. Listen to your advice. Follow your lead. Trust your direction.
2. **You Have Vision** — See what could be. Imagine possibilities. Can articulate direction. Others catch vision.
3. **You Influence Others** — People follow willingly. Your words carry weight. Others change based on your input. Influence is natural.
4. **You're Developed Others** — Mentored people. Others became leaders under you. People grew under your leadership. Reproduction is natural.
5. **You Handle Difficulty** — Don't shrink from conflict. Address problems directly. Make tough decisions. Stand by convictions.
6. **People Entrust You** — Others give you responsibility. Opportunities increase. Trust placed in you. Authority offered.

### Leadership Qualifications

1 Timothy 3:1-13 (KJV) outlines qualifications for church leaders (applies broadly):

**Personal Qualities:** Above reproach. Temperate/self-controlled. Sober-minded. Good behavior. Hospitable. Able to teach.

**Spiritual Maturity:** Not new believer. Strong faith. God's grace evident. Holy living.

**Family Life:** Faithful spouse. Children respect authority. Manages family well. Provides for family.

**Character:** Not greedy. Not violent. Peaceful, not quarrelsome. Loves what is good. Just and upright. Self-controlled.

**Maturity:** Not arrogant. Not quick-tempered. Not double-tongued. Not given to much wine. Holds fast to faith.

### Leadership Development

**Leadership isn't innate. It's developed.**

### Stages of Development:

**Level 1: Position** — Authority given by role. People follow because they have to. Limited influence.

**Level 2: Permission** — People like you. Relationship builds trust. People choose to follow.

**Level 3: Production** — You get results. Track record evident. People respect what you've accomplished. Influence increases.

**Level 4: People Development** — You develop others. Leaders emerge under you. Reproduction happening. Movement multiplying.

**Level 5: Pinnacle** — Rare level of influence. Respected across organization. Long-term vision impact. Legacy being built.

### Common Leadership Challenges

**1. The Temptation to Power** — Using position for personal gain. Controlling people. Demanding obedience. Not serving but being served.

**2. Loneliness of Leadership** — Burden of decisions. Can't share everything. Limited peer relationships. Weight of responsibility.

**3. Decision Fatigue** — Constant decisions. Second-guessing. Analysis paralysis. Fear of wrong choice.

**4. Criticism and Opposition** — Not everyone will like you. Decisions upset people. Personal attacks. Doubting yourself.

**5. Burnout** — Working too much. Never resting. No boundaries. Giving all reserves.

**6. Pride and Arrogance** — Thinking you know everything. Not listening to counsel. Considering yourself indispensable. Unwilling to admit mistakes.

### Thriving in Leadership

To lead well:

**1. Remember Your Purpose** — You serve people, not yourself. Your role is about God's purposes. Leadership is stewardship. You'll answer to God for leadership.

**2. Develop Other Leaders** — Identify potential leaders. Invest in their development. Give them responsibility. Release authority. Celebrate their success.

**3. Maintain Spiritual Disciplines** — Daily prayer essential. Scripture reading. Confession and repentance. Worship and adoration. Rest and sabbath.

**4. Listen to Others** — Seek counsel. Listen to team. Welcome feedback. Admit mistakes. Change when needed.

**5. Make Good Decisions** — Seek God first. Get input. Pray about major decisions. Take time (usually). Decide decisively.

**6. Lead with Integrity** — Do what you say. Keep commitments. Be honest always. Transparent about struggles. Model what you expect.

**7. Balance Life** — Protect family time. Maintain friendships. Exercise self-care. Don't become workaholic. Enjoy life.

## Chapter 15: Called to Teaching/Preaching

### Understanding Teaching Calling

**Teaching calling is God's invitation to explain His truth and help people understand Scripture.**

Teaching is a specific spiritual gift (Romans 12:7, 1 Corinthians 12:28) and calling. Not everyone is called to be a teacher.

#### James 3:1 (KJV)

*"My brethren, be not many masters, knowing that we shall receive the greater condemnation."*

**Teaching is serious responsibility.** Teachers answer to higher standard because they'll influence many.

### Teaching vs. Preaching

**Teaching:** Explanation of Scripture. Educational focus. Question and answer. Small groups often. Detailed content. Understanding emphasis.

**Preaching:** Proclamation of message. Inspirational focus. One-way communication. Larger audiences. Main points. Challenge and application emphasis.

Often the same person teaches and preaches, but they're different gifts.

### Types of Teaching Callings

**Pastoral Teaching:** Pulpit ministry. Sunday teaching. Sermon delivery. Congregational instruction.

**Small Group Teaching:** Bible studies. Adult classes. Discipleship groups. One-on-one mentoring.

**Educational Teaching:** Public school teaching. Christian school teaching. University ministry. Campus ministry.

**Specialized Teaching:** Children's ministry. Youth ministry. Prison ministry. Hospital ministry.

**Writing/Publishing:** Christian books. Curriculum writing. Blog/article writing. Scripture commentary.

### Recognizing Teaching Calling

Teaching calling typically shows:

- 1. Facility with Language** — Communicate clearly. Explain complex ideas simply. Words flow naturally. People understand you.
- 2. Love for Scripture** — Can't get enough of Bible. Scripture exciting to you. Always studying. Finding new insights.
- 3. Ability to Simplify** — Take complex and make simple. Break topics into pieces. Use illustrations/examples. People understand deeply.
- 4. Desire to Teach** — Want to help people learn. Energized by teaching. Frustrate by incomplete understanding. Fulfilled when people "get it."
- 5. People Learning Under You** — Others grow in understanding. Faith deepens through your teaching. Scripture becomes alive to them. They reference your teaching.

**6. Respect for Scripture** — Careful not to misinterpret. Honest about uncertainty. Willing to say “I don't know.” Committed to accuracy.

### What Good Teachers Do

Great teachers share common practices:

**1. Study Diligently** — Spend hours preparing. Research thoroughly. Understand context. Know Scripture well.

#### 2 Timothy 2:15 (KJV)

*“Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth.”*

**2. Pray for Students** — Prayer before teaching. Intercession for understanding. Asking God for clarity. Praying for hearts to receive.

**3. Know Your Audience** — Understand their background. Know their struggles. Speak to their level. Address their needs.

**4. Use Scripture, Not Opinion** — Ground teaching in Scripture. Don't use Bible as proof text. Accurate interpretation. Let Scripture speak.

**5. Encourage Application** — Help people apply truth. Challenge to change. Provide practical steps. Follow up on progress.

**6. Model the Teaching** — Live what you teach. Your life validates message. Authenticity evident. Character supports words.

### Common Teaching Challenges

**1. Pressure to Know Everything** — Students ask hard questions. Expected to have all answers. Fear of saying “I don't know.” Imposter syndrome.

### Thriving as a Teacher

To teach well:

**1. Spend Time in Prayer** — Pray before preparing. Pray during preparation. Pray before teaching. Pray for students.

**2. Study Scripture Seriously** — Use good commentaries. Study original languages (if possible). Consult different translations. Read widely.

**3. Know Your Audience** — Spend time with them. Understand their level. Know their questions. Address their needs.

**4. Prepare Thoroughly** — Don't wing it. Have clear outline. Practice delivery. Anticipate questions.

**5. Teach with Passion** — Love your subject. Convey excitement. Be authentic. Connect emotionally.

**6. Leave Room for Holy Spirit** — Don't over-prepare. Be flexible. Follow Spirit's leading. Allow questions and discussion.

## Chapter 16: Called to Service & Compassion

### Understanding Service Calling

**Service calling is God's invitation to meet the physical and emotional needs of suffering people.**

Jesus demonstrated this calling:

#### Matthew 20:28 (KJV)

*“Even as the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many.”*

**Service isn't beneath us.** Jesus washed feet. Service is the heart of Gospel.

### Types of Service Ministry

**Hands-On Service:** Feeding the hungry. Clothing the homeless. Visiting the sick. Comforting the grieving. Caring for elderly.

**Compassion Ministry:** Hospital visitation. Prison ministry. Hospice care. Crisis counseling. Addiction recovery support.

**Social Action:** Advocating for justice. Serving marginalized. Fighting trafficking. Anti-poverty work. Community development.

**Mercy Ministry:** Food banks. Homeless shelters. Counseling centers. Medical clinics. Community care centers.

### Recognizing Service Calling

Service calling typically shows:

- 1. Burden for Suffering** — Broken heart for hurting. Can't ignore need. Moved by injustice. Compelled to help.
- 2. Hands-On Care** — Want to work directly with people. Hands-on rather than administrative. Physical service appeals to you. Energy for practical help.
- 3. Love for Hurting** — Drawn to suffering people. Don't judge or condemn. Compassion evident. Genuine concern shown.
- 4. Willingness to Sacrifice** — Give time freely. Serve without recognition. Accept inconvenience. Put others first.
- 5. Ability to Listen** — People share with you. You hear their pain. Empathetic listening. Create safe space.
- 6. Persistence** — Don't give up on people. Stay committed long-term. Show up consistently. Follow through.

### Models for Service

**Jesus' Model:** Washed disciples' feet (service). Healed the sick. Welcomed children. Ate with sinners. Touched untouchables.

And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me.”*

2. **Protect Your Heart** — Maintain boundaries. Say no sometimes. Take breaks. Emotional health important.
3. **Build Community** — Serve with others. Share the burden. Encourage each other. Multiply impact.
4. **Focus on Spiritual Growth** — Pray for those you serve. Offer spiritual help. Point to Jesus. Holistic transformation.
5. **Celebrate Victories** — Notice progress. Give thanks. Share stories. Recognize impact.

**6. Take Care of Yourself** — Physical exercise. Emotional support. Spiritual disciplines. Family time. Rest and sabbath.

## Chapter 17: Called to Intercession & Prayer

### Understanding Intercession Calling

**Intercession is God's invitation to stand in the gap through prayer for others, situations, and nations.**

Intercessor is someone who:

- Prays persistently for specific people/places
- Carries burden from God
- Won't stop praying until breakthrough
- Sensitive to God's burdens
- Willing to sacrifice time for prayer

#### 1 Timothy 2:1-2 (KJV)

*"I exhort therefore, that, first of all, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for all men; For kings, and for all that are in authority; that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty."*

### Types of Intercession

**Personal Intercession:** Praying for individuals. Family members. Friends in need. People God lays on heart. One-on-one spiritual warfare.

**Corporate Intercession:** Group prayer meetings. Prayer vigils. Prayer chains. Congregational prayer. Organizational intercession.

**Geographic Intercession:** Praying for cities. Praying for nations. Praying for regions. Spiritual mapping. Territorial intercession.

**Prophetic Intercession:** Praying what God shows. Acting out prayers. Symbolic intercession. God-directed prayer. Spiritual warfare.

**Intercessory Fasting:** Prayer combined with fasting. Intensified intercession. Breaking through resistance. Spiritual breakthrough. God's priorities expressed.

### Recognizing Intercession Calling

Intercession calling typically shows:

- 1. Burden from God** — Feel things others don't. Moved to pray for specific things. Can't explain why burden is there. Persistence of burden.

### How Intercession Works

Intercession isn't just asking God for things. It's partnership with God.

#### Process of Intercession:

1. **Listen to God** — What is God burdening you to pray? What is God's concern? What is God doing? Join Him in prayer.

2. **Build Accountability** — Pray with others. Share burdens. Encourage each other. Keep growing.

God specifically called and gifted Bezalel for creative work in the tabernacle.

### Challenges in Creative Callings

**John the Baptist — The Forerunner:**

**Matthew 3:1-3 (KJV)**

*“In those days came John the Baptist, preaching in the wilderness of Judaea, And saying, Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand. For this is he that was spoken of by the prophet Esaias, saying, The voice of one crying in the wilderness, Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.”*

**Testing Prophecy**

**Not all who claim prophetic calling are accurate. Test prophetic words:**

**1 Thessalonians 5:19-21 (KJV)**

*“Quench not the Spirit. Despise not prophesyings. Prove all things; hold fast that which is good.”*

**Tests for True Prophecy:**

- 1. Does It Align with Scripture?** Never contradicts Bible. Always points to Jesus. Exalts God. Calls to righteousness.
- 2. Does It Come True?** Prophecies fulfilled. Accuracy evident. Track record good. Not vague.
